The project was recongnized as highly beneficial to individuals with disabilities.

"Having a good life involves connecting with the people around us, and being involved in our community and activities outside of work," said Mike Burke, president of MOHR. "Nonprofit service providers are innovators when it comes to enriching the lives of the individuals with disabilities, and they deserve more credit for their work."

The MOHR organization represents more than 100 such day programs across the state.

"The greenhouse work gives individuals with disabilities a source of pride, purpose and excitement to see plants grow from tiny seeds into healthy food and floral products, in addition to enjoying the subtle fragrances. The individuals served seem to like the ambiance, the outdoor work in the accessible high-tunnel, and meeting with customers and others who have an interest in the project," he said. "Back in April, four National Honor Society students from West Central Area High School in Barrett worked with several of our workers in prepping the raised beds for the season. The soil was prepped to perfection." said Todd Nelson, executive director of the Grant County DAC.

The DAC obtained a grant from the Otto Bremer Foundation in 2015 to create the greenhouse. Participants are paid for their work in planting, spot watering, weeding and harvesting, Nelson explains. They are able to meet

and interact with greenhouse customers. The program is planning to expand, with better quality produce and more interactions with the public, while at the same time keeping its size and scope manageable.

Burke said it's important for service providers to honor the choices of people with disabilities, who often want to participate in meaningful activities and community routines along with their friends. Day programs help navigate community interactions for individuals and give them more options that they otherwise wouldn't have, Burke explained. "It's part of creating a holistic life pattern and having people become a part of many things outside of work."

Nelson said the DAC is bringing a stronger focus to the greenhouse this year, expanding its output and limiting its variety. They recently partnered with local culinary establishment LA FERME in Alexandria, providing them with freshly picked produce. Chef Matt from LA FERME stated, "We are always very happy to make these connections with our community, and help support programs like this."
